Those days are gone now.

So many of us have prayed that God will provide a way for us to restore the lake and those good times.

Amazingly, the City of Live Oak has offered to give Camp Weed 400,000 gallons of water EVERY DAY for the next 20 years!

The city's environmental experts have determined that this water must go somewhere. If not to us, then to somebody else.

And their findings show the best spot for the water is the property at Camp Weed.

To receive this blessing, we simply have to help provide the infrastructure necessary to receive the water from the city.

The present site of Camp Weed and the Cerveny Conference
Center was originally chosen because it was situated on the water.
Our beautiful Mandi's Chapel and the Conference Center complex
were designed to take advantage of the presence of water nearby
and to share its beauty, peace and tranquility with those who visit
it. Because of droughts in the last few years, our lake has dwindled
so that it is hard to see water at all today.

We miss its beauty. We lack the sort of spiritual focus that it provided.
We need it as a constant reminder to us of the spiritual importance
of water, and especially of the water of baptism.

We have a magnificent plan now to restore that water, and to once
more make our lake and the Cerveny Conference Center and Camp
Weed the sort of place that it was originally designed to be, centered
around gracious and life-giving water where our campers can play
and beside which all of us can gather, pray, and draw closer to God.

I encourage all of you to give generously to the New Water, New
Life campaign for the restoration of our lake. It is important to
Camp Weed and the Cerveny Conference Center. It is important
to your Diocese. It will be important to generations who will follow
us as they seek the nearer presence of God.
